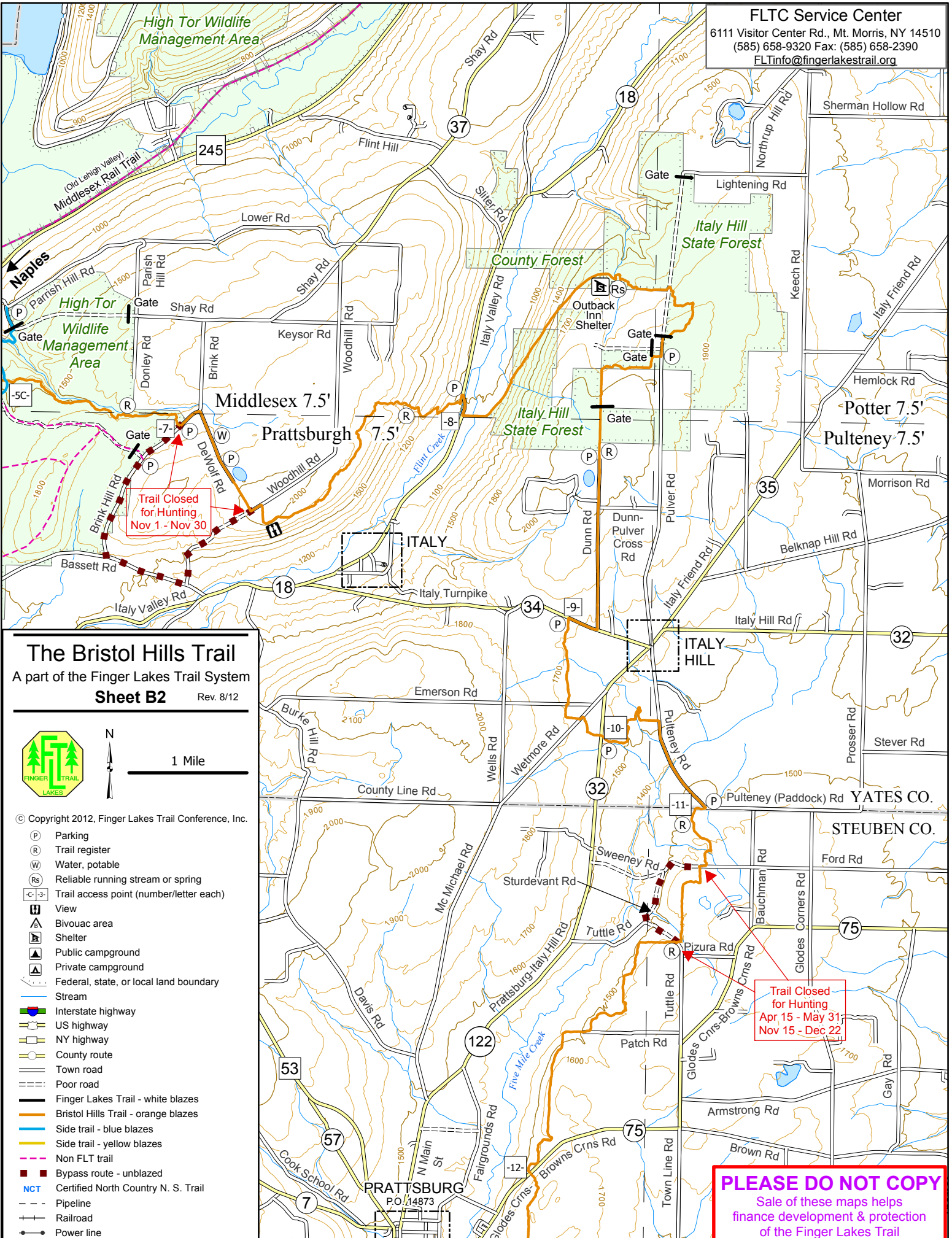
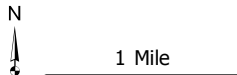

Description of trail from north to south

- 0.0 Access 7 Left on Brink Hill Road, shoulder parking (1730').
- 0.2 Right (S) on DeWolf Rd. Note: Trail ahead is closed for hunting Nov. 1 – Nov. 30. Exact dates will be posted at the end of DeWolf Rd. and at Woodhill Rd. Use Brinkhill Rd., Basset Rd., and Woodhill Rd. to bypass.
- 0.4 Water is available for hikers from a hydrant 100 feet up the driveway of the Colle home at 3882 DeWolf Rd.
- 0.9 South end of Dewolf Rd., parking (1980'). Trail goes southwest into field. Soon pass pond on left, then views of windmill farm on right (W).
- 1.2 Left (E) on Wood Hill Rd.
- 1.3 Right (S) off Wood Hill Rd (2040').
- 1.5 Jump-off with spectacular view to the south (2020'), soon enter woods. Trail now heads generally northeast.
- 2.7 Right on woods road, and then quickly left off it. Note that the landowner has created many red, blue, and yellow trails in the vicinity. Be careful to follow both orange blazes and orange FLT discs (double discs at turns) both here and ahead as the red blazes approximate the orange ones of the trail.
- 3.2 Begin descent eastward on logging road (1800'); be careful as the trail goes on and off this logging road a number of times.
- 3.9 Sharp right (S) onto logging road, then in 250 feet a sharp left (NE) off this road.
- 4.1 Enter field, go straight across (E) to yellow FLT sign on tree, then at tree line turn left (N) onto old road.
- 4.2 Right (S) on CR 18 (Italy Valley Rd.). Parking. Trail crosses Flint Creek on highway bridge.
- 4.4 Access 8 Left (E) off CR 18, shoulder parking (1010'). Trail crosses field with a few trees.
- 4.6 Left (NE) on a logging road to begin long gradual climb of hill.
- 6.2 Outback Inn Shelter on right (1690'); NEW, replaced in Oct. 2011 by BSA Otetiana Council Troop 37. There is a picnic table, open air privy, and fire ring. A reliable stream can be found at Access 8 and during the wetter part of the year at creek just ahead 0.1 mi. Be sure to purify water.
- 6.3 Cross reliable stream (1630').
- 6.9 Cross abandoned section of Pulver Road.
- 7.8 Left (S) on abandoned Pulver Road.
- 7.9 Reach drivable Pulver Rd., gate, parking (1970').
- 8.0 Right (W) off Pulver Rd.
- 8.6 Left (S) on abandoned section of Dunn Rd (1880').
- 8.9 Pass gate.
- 9.3 Emerge on drivable section of Dunn Rd., parking, trail register (2030'). Soon pass large pond on right.
- 10.9 Right (W) on CR 34 (Italy Turnpike Rd., 1680')
- 11.1 Access 9 Left (S) off CR 34, poor shoulder parking. Mostly wooded path ahead.
- 11.9 Cross Emerson Road heading south following mostly hedgerows and fields.
- 12.2 Left on Wetmore Rd., then right off it in 150'.
- 12.5 Access 10 Cross CR 32 (Italy Hill Rd.) after crossing field (1630').
- 13.4 Right (S) on Pulteney Rd. (1550').
- 14.3 Access 11 Right (SW) off Pulteney Rd. There is shoulder parking a little to the east on the north side of the road.
- 14.4 Pass trail register on right.
- 15.0 Right (W) on Ford Rd., then left off it in 200'. Note: Trail ahead is closed for hunting Nov. 15 - Dec. 22 and Apr. 15 - May 31. Use Ford, Sturdevant, and Tuttle Roads to bypass as shown on map.
- 15.9 Cross Tuttle Road (1600').
- 16.4 Heading south, emerge from woods into field; trail continues slightly to the left on mowed path. Back into woods.
- 17.4 Right (W) on logging road, crossing a creek, leaving it on left in 0.2 mi.
- 18.5 Right (W) on another logging road, leaving it on left in 250'.
- 19.0 Access 12 Cross CR 75 (Glodes Corners – Browns Corners Rd.) after short steep climb (1600'). End of map B2.

REGULATIONS:

- Do not stray from the trail.
- Fires and camping only at designated areas.
- Take your litter back home.
- Purify all water used along trail.
- Road Hiking: Stay on shoulder off vehicle surface, travel single file, facing oncoming vehicle traffic.
- Private land: No bicycles, horses, motor-powered vehicles or snowmobiles unless landowner has given operator written permission for such use. State land: No horses, motor-powered vehicles or snowmobiles unless trail is marked to allow their use. Bicycle use is not authorized by FLTC, unless explicitly approved by state managing agency. No camping within 150' of water sources, roads, or the trail unless designated as such by the state agency.
- Because the FLT crosses varied terrain, steep slopes, rough footing, and watercourses, hikers must realize that they are responsible for their own safety and judgment in selecting hikes that are within their capabilities.
- Dogs should be leashed when on the trail on private properties and most state park lands. The dog policy is available on the FLT website.
