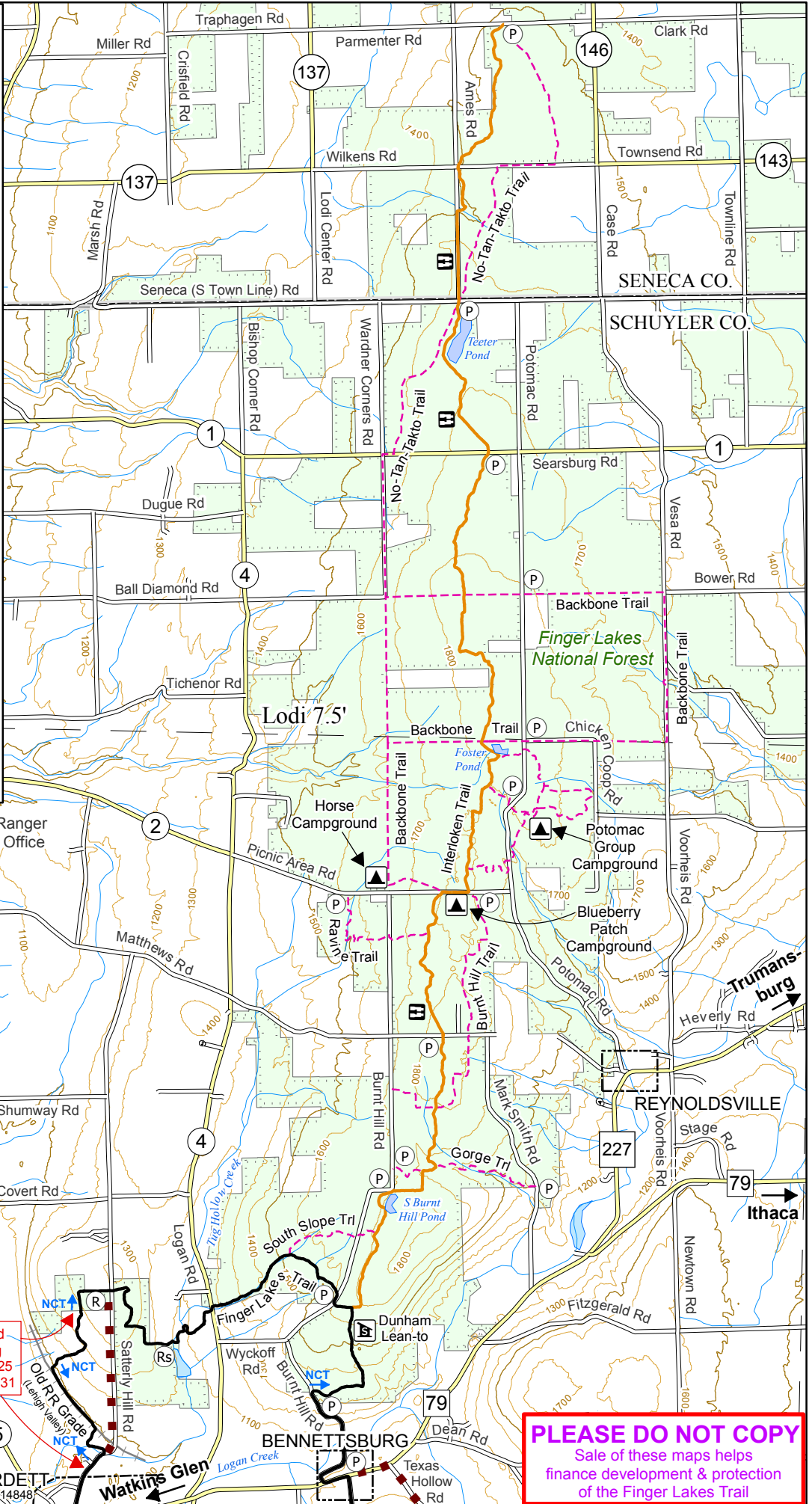

Miles Description of Trail from south to north

0.0	Start of section (white blazes here) at Forest Service parking lot on Burnt Hill Rd., about a half mile south of its intersection with Wycoff Rd. Start of NCT* on Interloken Trail (1300').	4.3	Intersection of Interloken Trail and Ravine Trail. Interloken continues north.
0.3	Trail passes to south of small wildlife pond.	4.7	Intersection of Interloken Trail and Picnic Area Rd (1800'). Trail follows road east 0.2 mile past Blueberry Patch Recreation Area. Parking and camping here, but presently there is no water available. Red House Country Inn B&B is on Picnic Area Rd., just to west (607)546-8566.
0.4	Trail turns to north with open field south and a good view down into valley.	4.9	Interloken Trail leaves Picnic Area Rd. and continues to north.
0.9	Side trail on right (east) to Dunham Lean-to (open front) with fireplace and outhouse, but no water source nearby.	5.7	Interloken Trail intersects with Potomac Trail, with wildlife pond nearby. This trail goes west 0.2 mi. to Potomac Rd. and in 0.3 mi. reaches Potomac Group Campground (permit required and no water available presently).
1.0	Intersection of Interloken and main Finger Lakes Trail (1550'). Interloken continues to east (orange blazes). Main trail (white blazes) goes westerly to parking area. End of NCT* on Interloken Trail.	6.0	Interloken Trail passes another Potomac Trail, going west 0.2 mi. to Potomac Rd.
1.6	Intersection of Interloken and South Slope Trail, which goes west; Interloken continues to north.	6.1	Interloken Trail passes west side of Foster wildlife pond.
2.0	Intersection of Interloken Trail and Burnt Hill Rd. (1700', parking), after passing wildlife pond. Interloken trail continues east through hedgerow and down old road.	6.2	Intersection of Interloken and Backbone Trails. Interloken continues north. Backbone Trail goes east to parking lot.
2.4	Intersection of Interloken Trail and Gorge Trail and beginning of coinciding section. Interloken and Gorge Trails continue easterly. Gorge Trail goes westerly, passes a wildlife pond, and reaches a parking area 0.3 mi. away.	7.2	Trail crosses small stream on bridge.
2.5	Interloken and Gorge Trails cross stream on "Big Tube" bridge. Interloken goes northerly at end of bridge. Gorge Trail continues easterly downhill for 0.8 mi. to Mark Smith Rd. and parking.	7.4	Interloken Trail intersects with Backbone Trail again (1850'). Backbone goes east 0.4 mi. to parking lot and Interloken continues north.
2.9	Intersection of Interloken and Burnt Hill Trails. Interloken Trail continues northerly, Burnt Hill Trail goes east and west.	8.6	Interloken Trail crosses Schuyler Co. Rd. 1 (Searsburg Rd., parking, 1740') Trail continues through gate on north side of road northwest through pasture to another gate (~0.3 mile).
3.5	Interloken Trail crosses Matthews Rd (1830'). Parking area to west. Trail continues through gate and across pasture to north. Note the great views to the west.	9.5	Interloken Trail passes west side of Teeter wildlife pond.
3.7	End of pasture section. Interloken continues north through gate into hardwoods.	9.7	Interloken Trail intersects with No-Tan-Takto Trail.
		9.8	Interloken Trail crosses Seneca Road (1630', parking) and continues through gate on north side of road, on old road in pasture to second gate (~0.4 mile).
		10.8	Interloken Trail crosses Townsend Road, continues to north.
		12.0	Interloken Trail at parking lot on Parmenter Road (1540') ~0.6 mile west of hamlet of Townsendville.

Note 1: The main FLT on private land between the south end of Satterly Hill Road (twin tunnels) north to the Finger Lakes National Forest boundary on the main FLT is closed by landowner for hunting from Oct. 1 to Dec. 25 and May 1 to May 31. Bypass this section of trail during these dates by using Satterly Hill Road.

When map and marked route differ: follow signs, blazes, or even temporary flagging tape.

Unlike maps, guidebooks are updated less frequently; if guidebook and map disagree, use the map.

\*NCT – North Country National Scenic Trail. This section of the FLT/Interloken Trail is an official segment of the 4200-mile NCT.

REGULATIONS:

1. Fires and camping only at designated areas on map or at other approved locations.
2. Take your litter back home.
3. Purify all water used along trail.
4. Road hiking: Stay on shoulder off vehicle surface, travel single file, facing oncoming vehicle traffic.
5. Private land: No bicycles, horses, motor-powered vehicles or snowmobiles unless landowner has given operator written permission for such use. Federal land: No horses, motor-powered vehicles or snowmobiles unless trail is marked to allow their use. Bicycle use is not authorized by FLTC, unless explicitly approved by the U.S. Forest Service. No camping within 150' of water sources, roads, or the trail unless designated as such.
6. Because the FLT crosses varied terrain, steep slopes, rough footing, and watercourses, hikers must realize that they are responsible for their own safety and judgment in selecting hikes that are within their capabilities.
7. Dogs should be leashed when on the trail on private properties and most state park lands. The dog policy is available on the FLT website.

The U.S. Forest Service encourages use of undeveloped areas.
